East Baton Rouge Council on Aging | Annual Report









The East Baton Rouge Council on Aging (EBRCOA) is dually designated as an Area Agency on Aging (AAA) and a Council on Aging (COA). **EBRCOA** oversight agencies includes the Administration of Aging, which is responsible for enforcing the Older Americans Act, the Governor's Office of Elderly Affairs (GOEA) is the State Unit on Aging, which manages the Louisiana State Plan on Aging, and is the dedicated state agency for administering federal funds from the Administration on Aging. The EBRCOA is governed by the Area Plan that the agency submits to GOEA for the period of 2019-2021. The agency is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization with a quasi-governmental designation.

Goverance

EBRCOA is mandated by the Older Americans Act (OAA), to respond to the needs of Americans aged 60 and over in the local community, with the goal of keeping seniors living independently in their own homes.

Preference shall be given to providing services to older individuals with greatest social need, with particular attention to low-income minority individuals. The term greatest economic need is defined as the need resulting from an income level at or below the poverty threshold established by the Bureau of the Census.

The term greatest social need means the need caused by non-economic factors, which include physical and mental disabilities, language barriers, cultural or social isolation including that caused by racial or ethnic status, which restrict an individual's ability to perform normal daily tasks or threaten his capacity to live independently.

Full service providers shall attempt to provide services to low-income minority individuals, at least in proportion to the number of low-income minority older persons in the population services by the provider.



Performance Expectations

Performance expectations of the state and federal agencies of the East Baton Rouge Council on Aging includes:

- Increasing the number of senior citizens who have access to an integrated array of health and social supports;
- Increasing the number of senior citizens who stay active and healthy;
- Increasing the number of families who are supported in their efforts to care for their loved ones at home and in the community; and
- Increasing the number of senior citizens who benefit from programs that protects their rights and prevent elder abuse, neglect and exploitation.
- Facilitating leadership in developing and improving transportation options for the elderly in the Public Service Area.
- Providing assistance with applying for benefits and programs.

Each of these performance indicators must be met to ensure not only effective delivery of services to seniors, but also to receive state and federal dollars to manage and operate Councils on Aging.

The coronavirus pandemic and the treacherous hurricane season we experience here in South Louisiana were the causes of these challenges. The entire agency felt the effects of these disasters. We needed to respond to the needs

of our senior community much differently from our standard procedures. Nevertheless, the adjustments made to our programming and operations were to sustain such challenges and ultimately expanded our productivity, and increased our agency's footprint within the community.

The support and dedication shown to seniors of this parish by our Board of Directors, Advisory Board Members, and staff members are commendable. I want to thank all of them for their hard work and countless sacrifices to serve the seniors. The residents of East Baton Rouge Parish truly care about the aging community. The myriad of volunteers, support from the community stakeholders, and donations received during this time period have been phenomenal, and we are immensely thankful.

Please read through our Annual Report. This report reflects on our service, highlights agency milestones, and provides insight into what the agency currently has on the horizon. COVID-19 Response

The East Baton Rouge Council on Aging was dedicated to ensuring the safety and wellbeing of all seniors across the parish during the COVID-19 pandemic. On March 13, 2020, EBRCOA transitioned to limited operations to protect against the transmission of the virus among staff members and the seniors that we serve. The CDC advised individuals not to congregate in groups of 50 or more, which demanded us to immediately suspend our Homemaker and Respite services, Lotus Rides, and close all congregate senior center locations throughout the entirety of the pandemic. In an abundance of caution, we transitioned to a drive-thru meal service where seniors could drive up to their respective centers, pop their trunk and a staff member placed a hot meal into their vehicle.

Lotus Food Pantry


The Lotus Food Pantry is a senior-focused free food pantry designed to combat senior hunger in EBR Parish. Typically, the Lotus Food Pantry service is only available to EBRCOA seniors who are food pantry recipients; however, we open this service to all senior residents in East Baton Rouge Parish during the pandemic. We are overwhelmed with joy to have served **35,300** seniors across EBR parish with fresh fruit and vegetables, household

items, toiletries, face mask, and a hot lunch. It's our duty to ensure seniors have access to food and basic necessities.





What have we done?


The Information and Assistance Department is the heart of the agency whose primary role is to bridge the gap between senior clients and the community by providing seniors access to area services that can improve their quality of life. The Information and Assistance Department consists of Intake Coordinators, Clerical Assistants, Care Managers, Referral Coordinators, and Social Workers. Our goal is to identify the needs of seniors through Louisiana Independent Living Assessments so that we can continue to provide services such as Meals on Wheels, Homemaker/Personal Care, In-Home Respite, Power to Care Entergy assistance and Material Aid. Between March 2020 to June 2020, the agency suspended several of our services in order to protect our seniors and their caregivers from contracting the COVID-19 virus.






Congregate Meals

The Nutritional Director, Chef Celeste Gill, incorporated new menu items which created more variety for our seniors to enjoy. The seniors were able to come into our facilities and eat their meals until March 2020 when COVID-19 restrictions required a change in operations.

Meal on Wheels

The Council on Aging Meals on Wheels Department is dedicated to making sure our seniors receive nutritional prepacked meals on a weekly basis. We were able to service over **5,000** seniors daily across the parish at **1,820,000** meals per year.



The Lotus Food Pantry has become one of the largest senior pantries in EBR Parish and decreased senior hunger tremendously in our community. Over **8,000** seniors received a variety of non-perishable items, household items, and fresh produce at our food pantry drive-thru. We would like to thank our sponsors and volunteers for your generosity and continued dedication to our seniors. The Lotus Food Pantry is open to all qualified seniors across EBR Parish ages 60 years or above.














Pop-Up Vaccination Clinic

Beginning March 10, 2021, the EBRCOA hosted weekly pop up vaccination clinics at The Lotus Center, 1701 Main Street, open to all individuals in EBR parish to receive the COVID-19 vaccine. This weekly clinic was made possible in collaboration with LDH, Office of Public Health, Ochsner's, Mayor-President Sharon Weston-Broome, the Governor's Health Equity Task Force, the Louisiana Legislative Black Caucus, the Louisiana National Guard and Albertsons. We understood the importance of ensuring access to the vaccines was equitable and easily accessible to anyone who was eligible for a vaccine.



Homebound Vaccine Clinic

Across the parish are homebound individuals who were unable to visit vaccination sites in order to be vaccinated. On Monday, March 15, 2021, we took the initiative to distribute the vaccine to homebound seniors and our Meals on Wheels clients. In partnership with Mayor-President Sharon Weston-Broome, LDH, Healthy BR, and EBR Emergency Medical Services. Seniors across the parish were fully vaccinated without having to leave their homes. We provided essential services to the seniors of EBR parish and ensuring their safety from the COVID-19 virus was our top priority.

Communication was essential and technology became vital to staying in contact with our seniors. It's important for seniors to make it a priority to learn how to properly use the latest devices such as a smart phone, computer, or tablet in order to stay in touch with the world around them.



Lotus Zone Radio Show

The purpose of The Lotus Zone Senior Radio Show is to engage, educate, and entertain seniors and their caregivers through a series of topics, such as senior news, health care tips, radio bingo, giveaways and much more. On Technology Tuesday, EBRCOA gives away tablets, laptops, and smart televisions to seniors to assist them in staying connected with agency updates, family, and friends. Technology Tuesday was made possible through a grant from the National Meals on Wheels of America. Seniors can tune in every Tuesday at 4 PM for a live show on our social media platforms, our website (www.ebrcoa.org) or listen in on 106.1 FM WTQT.



Virtual Fitness & Wellness

Our Virtual Fitness program lowers the risk of chronic diseases, reduces their impact, and improves seniors balance and strength. EBRCOA certified fitness instructors guide seniors through step by step fitness routines such as Yoga/ Tai Chi Aerobics and Line Dancing that can be performed in the comfort of their own homes. 

Reflections, Changes, and Adjustments due to the COVID-19 Pandemic

As the COVID-19 virus spread and stay-at-home orders were issued, the agency shifted our focus into combat mode with the leadership of our Chief Executive Officer, Mrs. Tasha Clark-Amar. The Information and Assistance Department has held together, despite the unimaginable loss of lives throughout our senior population, as well as personal family. Although so much has changed, we've adapted to the new way of life and stood strong in serving the senior citizens of East Baton Rouge Parish. Several of our services are suspended in order to avoid direct contact with seniors who are the most vulnerable in contracting the COVID-19 virus. Seniors may soon be able to resume activities as normal prior to the pandemic.

EBRCOA are essential workers and our staff have been on the frontline throughout the pandemic continuing to serve our agency mission. COVID-19 may have turned our lives upside down, but we as an agency will continue to restructure our operations to serve the seniors of this parish. As we continue to practice social distancing and avoiding large groups of individuals, we will emphasize the importance of technology and staying connected with those around you during this time.



Capital Investments | Central Lotus Activity Center



Senior Centers serve as a gateway in the community, connecting older adults to services that maintain their health and independence. These centers provide hot congregate meals, cognitive activities, daily fitness, and access to a Social Worker. Ensuring that senior centers are located in close proximity to East Baton Rouge Parish residents is a very high priority of the East Baton Rouge Council on Aging. Our goal is to provide senior centers that are easy for the community to access. Our new Central Lotus Activity Center meets that goal. The Central Lotus Activity Center is a brand new 8,000 square ft building located off Hooper Road in the Central Community. This nearly 8,000 square foot facility is a very modern center with several amenities to accommodate the active population of seniors within the community equipped with state-of-the-art technology. This facility is situated in front of a recently renovated park, a fully stocked pond, and a walking trail.

The East Baton Rouge Council on Aging renovated the old fire station located on Gus Young Ave and 38th Street in the heart of the Eden Park Community. The Ageless Circle is the home of our Lotus Zone Senior Radio Show that is featured on the radio and all of EBRCOA's social media platforms. This program assists in improving the youth's academic performance, allowing the seniors to teach the youth various trades, life skills, and enhance seniors' technological capabilities. In addition, this program will reduce social isolation for the seniors and youth, allowing them to engage with one another in structured activities. This center will also allow the seniors and youth to cultivate meaningful and long-standing relationships.

The center features a high-tech computer lab, multipurpose room, conference room, offices, state-of-the-art recording music studio, and custom-built outdoor kitchen for entertainment. This is the home of the Lotus Zone Radio Show that is featured on the radio and all of EBRCOA's social media platforms. The Grand Opening Ribbon Cutting Celebration was held on Friday, June 18, 2021. The event had several community stakeholders, senior volunteers, and the Eden Park community celebrating the new staple of the Eden Park Community.

The current Administration Building and Commercial Kitchen located at 5790 Florida Blvd is antiquated and lacks the space needed to sustain the ever-growing workforce of the East Baton Rouge Council on Aging. For years the agency has needed to expand the commercial kitchen and allow more space to produce and store nutritional meals. As East Baton Rouge Parish residents continue to gracefully age, new seniors are added to our programs daily, and the need for expansion is dire. Currently under construction at 965 North 18th Street is the agency's New Administration Building (The Lotus Headquarters). The East Baton Rouge Council on Aging is confident that the new Lotus Headquarters facility will continue to affirm our mission of Supporting Independence ~ Serving Seniors. Several construction milestones have recently taken place at 965 North 18th Street:

- •The rough-in of all necessary mechanicals
 - The installation of steel framing

- Pouring of the concrete slab
- The installation of aluminum decking




The architect of record for this project is the Map Design Group LLC, and the general contractor is Percy J. Matherne Constructors. The East Baton Rouge Council on Aging is genuinely excited about the much-needed space of this facility and the service to the aging community that East Baton Rouge Council on Aging will provide in this facility. This new facility is slated for completion in the last quarter of 2021. Upon completing the Lotus Headquarters, EBRCOA will vacate 5790 Florida Blvd and return possession of this property to the East Baton Rouge City-Parish.

On the Horizon | Lotus Village



Lotus Village is a planned senior community, replacing five blighted, and abandoned blocks in the Suburb Gracie neighborhood. This community will embrace a village-style development concept, providing seniors with easy access to necessities such as health care and nutrition while offering tons of leisure and recreational-style amenities. Adjacent to the new Lotus Headquarters, Lotus Village will provide 116 homes to seniors in East Baton Rouge Parish. These homes are FORTIFIED and Energy Star rental units. The cost associated with building FORTIFIED, Energy Star housing on a site that manages its stormwater on-site is significantly higher than a traditional housing development, but the cost to react to the effects of flooding and vulnerable seniors with high utility cost are much more significant.


The units offered in Lotus Village are all One Bedroom Units and range from 790 square feet to 1088 square feet in size. The East Baton Rouge Council on Aging has partnered with Gulf Coast Housing Partners to develop Lotus Village. Through this great partnership, the Lotus Village project has successfully obtained funding from various sources through competitive application processes. Those awards include a 4% LIHTC, \$10 Million from CDBG Funds by Louisiana Housing Corporation, and \$750,000 from AHP Dallas. Our Lotus Village project is estimated to be complete in November 2022.



Since 1991, the East Baton Rouge Council on Aging has owned 2.99 Acres of land in the unincorporated area of Baker, LA. The current administration was unaware that we held ownership of this property until researching all properties owned by the East Baton Rouge Council on Aging. This discovery could not have come at a better time as we were actively searching for available property in the area. When the East Baton Rouge Council on Aging received the millage in 2016, expanding our footprint to serve our seniors in rural areas more efficiently was a commitment. In keeping that commitment, Lotus Village at the Lake will be home to our first Housing Development in the Northern part of the parish. Our goal is to develop 60 rental units and a state-of-the-art Baker-Zachary Senior Center. The Senior Center developed at this site will replace both the Baker and Zachary Senior Center, as it is centrally located between both.

The East Baton Council on Aging will partner with Gulf Coast Housing Partner to develop Lotus Village at the Lake. This project is currently in the planning phase, and we are excited about this new development.
