East Baton Rouge Council on Aging | Annual Report



The EBRCOA is mandated by the Older Americans Act (OAA), to respond to the needs of Americans aged 60 and over in the local community with the goal of keeping seniors living independently in their own homes. AAAs plan and provide social services and nutrition services for elders, and support for caregivers.

Governance

The East Baton Rouge Council on Aging (EBRCOA) is both an Area Agency on Aging (AAA) and a Council on Aging (COA). EBRCOA is governed by the Administration of Aging which is responsible for enforcing the Older Americans Act and the Governor's Office of Elderly Affairs (GOEA) which manages the Louisiana State Plan on Aging. The EBRCOA is allocated funding through the Area Plan which is a grant application the agency submits to the GOEA for the period 2022-2025.

Performance Expectations

The Governor's Office of Elderly Affairs (GOEA) has provided the following performance indicators as a means of measuring COA performance.

- Increase the number of older persons who have access to an integrated array of health and social supports;
- Increase the number of older persons who stay active and healthy;
- Increase the number of families who are supported in their efforts to care for their loved ones at home and in the community; and
- Increase the number of older people who benefit from programs that protect their rights and prevent elder abuse, neglect, and exploitation.

- Facilitate leadership in developing and improving transportation options for the elderly in the Public Service Area and
- Providing assistance with applying for benefits and programs.
- The seventh and final goal is to educate consumers on services provided by Ombudsman and display and distribute flyers provided by GOEA, and provide opportunities for Ombudsman to speak to staff and clients about the service to promote awareness.



Information Assistance & Management


The Information Assistance & Management Department consists of Intake Coordinators, Clerical Assistants, Care Managers, Social Workers, and Management Information Systems (MIS) available to answer questions, conduct thorough assessments of client needs, make appropriate service recommendations, and refer clients to services at COA.

The purpose of Information Assistance & Management is to encourage and assist older individuals to utilize facilities and services available to them. IA&M provides the older adults with the most current information on opportunities and services available within the community. Furthermore, IA&M focuses on assessing individual problems and capacities, while linking seniors with direct services and resolutions. The department holistically conducts assessments, Continuum of Care Coordination, advocacy and outreach, and related care management activities.



The Lotus Food Pantry

Combating Senior Hunger

East Baton Rouge Council on Aging Lotus Food Pantry is a senior-focused free food pantry designed to combat senior hunger in East Baton Rouge Parish. Our pantry service is made possible through a partnership with the Greater Baton Rouge Food Bank, and the USDA.

During the fiscal year, the Lotus Food Pantry continued to operate under COVID-19 modified restrictions, which consisted of no in-person shopping. To better protect our seniors, the agency implemented a drive-thru pantry pickup system that instructed seniors to drive-up, pop their trunks, and a staff member would place their groceries and personal items into the vehicle.

Each week our seniors receive, but are not limited to, meat products, produce, water, juices, milk, eggs, cereal, snacks, household and personal care items. This great selection of items provide our seniors with a well-balanced and nutritious diet.







The East Baton Rouge Council on Aging has outgrown our current administration building and commercial kitchen located at 5790 Florida Blvd. due to the influx of new senior members and additional programs and services. We're elated to announce the official completion date of the agency's new administration building and commercial kitchen (The Lotus Headquarters) located at 965 North 18th Street slated for August 2022. Upon completing the Lotus Headquarters, EBRCOA will vacate 5790 Florida Blvd and return possession of this property to the East Baton Rouge City-Parish.

The architect of record for this project is the Map Design Group LLC, and the general contractor is Percy J. Matherne Constructor, Inc.

Capital Investments | Lotus Village - Senior Independent Living Community



Lotus Village is a senior independent living community located in the heart of mid-city Suburb Gracie neighborhood. This community will embrace a village-style development concept, providing seniors with easy access to necessities such as health care and nutrition while offering tons of leisure and recreational-style amenities. Adjacent to the new Lotus Headquarters, Lotus Village will provide 116 homes to seniors in East Baton Rouge Parish.

The units offered in Lotus Village are all one-bedroom units and range from 790 square feet to 1088 square feet in size. The East Baton Rouge Council on Aging has partnered with Gulf Coast Housing Partners to develop Lotus Village. Through this great partnership, the Lotus Village project has successfully obtained funding from various sources through competitive application processes. Our Lotus Village project is scheduled to have 34 units available in August 2022.


